Introduction

Mental disorders are life threatening, life ending, disabling and pandemic. Among market economies such as the U.S., mental disorders are ranked as the second most common disease burden. A compelling testimony to this burden is the estimate that nearly half of all Americans will experience a mental disorder in their lifetime. The first ever Surgeon General's Report on Mental Health (1999) highlighted the need to address mental health and mental illness as important concerns at all stages in the life cycle and set the foundation for Healthy People 2010 to designate mental illness as a major concern and mental health as a leading indicator of public health. Among mental health disorders depression and anxiety (D/A) are the most prevalent. Though it is widely accepted that D/A are negative affective disorders influencing outcomes in mental illness and chronic disease there remain many unanswered questions about the epidemiology of D/A co-morbidity and its influence on health outcomes in general. Moreover, the influence of social, cultural, economic and political factors on mental-physical co-morbidity is poorly understood and requires systematic investigation.

It is notable that mental-physical co-morbidity as a domain of mental health is ill defined. Consequently, mental-physical co-morbidity in general and D/A co-morbidity specifically remain undiagnosed, under diagnosed and under studied especially among vulnerable populations (e.g. racial/ethnic minorities, communities in poverty) who experience disparities in mental health service access, utilization, and outcomes. Importantly, defined as a domain of mental health, mental-physical co-morbidity is not a required competency in medical education, training and practice. Synthesizing and reporting our current knowledge about D/A co-morbidity in the context of our increasingly multi-cultural society is a logical and important step toward defining mental-physical co-morbidity as a science and developing appropriate and sustainable approaches to inculcating this area of study in medical pedagogy, practice and research.

- Review current understanding of the role of D/A Co-morbidity in the use and process of healthcare, self efficacy, health outcomes and public mental and physical health with a focus on vulnerable populations.

Super Shuttle provides service between BWI and Historic Inns at a cost of approximately \$29 one way and does not require advanced reservations. The Airport Shuttle, Inc. provides service from BWI, Washington Dulles, and Ronald Reagan National Airports, Amtrak, and Penn-Station-Baltimore. The Unmet Mental Health Needs of Homeless Persons
Lillian Gelberg, MD, MSPH

Dr. Gelberg is George F. Kneller Professor of Family Medicine at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. She is a health services researcher and family physician who conducts community-based research on the health, access to care, and quality of care of homeless and other vulnerable populations. She earned her M.D. from Harvard and her M.S.P.H. from the UCLA School of Public Health.

Dr. Gelberg has studied homeless adults living in shelters and outdoor areas, and the health and use of health services among homeless and low-income housed patients; change in health status, use of health services, and the antecedents and consequences of victimization among homeless adults; delays in onset of treatment for tuberculosis patients; health status, contraception use, access to care, and patient satisfaction among homeless women in shelters and food programs; and the epidemiology and use of health services for homeless persons with HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C.

Orrin Devinsky, MD

Orrin Devinsky is Professor of Neurology, Neurosurgery, and Psychiatry at NYU School of Medicine. He directs the NYU Comprehensive Epilepsy Centers and the Saint Barnabas Institute of Neurology and Neurosurgery (INN). He received his B.S. and M.S. from Yale University, M.D. from Harvard Medical School and interned at Boston's Beth Israel Hospital. He completed neurology training at the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and his epilepsy fellowship at the NIH.

His epilepsy research interests include quality-of-life, cognitive and behavioral issues in epilepsy, surgical therapy, and new medications. He has published widely in epilepsy and behavioral neurology, with more than 250 articles and chapters and more than 20 books and monographs. He has chaired several committees of the American Epilepsy Society and has served as a Board member. He is currently on the board of the national Epilepsy Foundation. He is Co-Editor of *epilepsy.com*, *Epilepsy and Behavior*, and *Reviews in Neurological Diseases*.
